


Concise Style

A.K.A. Avoiding Wordiness



Most scientists regarded the new streamlined peer-review process as 'quite an improvement.'

How can I make my writing more concise?

- 1. Avoid clutter
- 2. Omit words that add no meaning
- 3. Select strong, powerful words



X Rule 1: Avoid excess or "clutter"

Using the fewest number of words to make the point is always best

X Rule 1: Avoid excess or "clutter"

One word can often replace phrases. Use a thesaurus!

X Rule 1: Avoid excess or "clutter"

Avoid <u>helping verbs</u>, unnecessary <u>verb</u>
 <u>phrases with infinitives</u> (to + verb), and
 <u>prepositional phrases</u>

- Bad: Parents <u>have to lay down</u> rules <u>in</u> order to establish expectations.
- Better: Parents must establish expectations through rules.

Quick! Revise these sentences.

- Bad: Felicia is going to try out for the play.
- Better: Felicia will audition for the play.

Quick! Revise these sentences.

- Bad: All <u>of the advisers for the</u> president provided opinions <u>in writing</u>.
- Better: The president's advisers provided written opinions.

X Rule 1: Avoid excess or "clutter"

- Use adjectives sparingly. When to use them?
 - When appealing to senses (spicy, raw)
 - When suggesting specific quantities (few)



that detract from your point and add nothing to the sentence's meaning.



- Incorrect: I personally think that Alicia is wrong.
- Your writing = your thoughts. They are personal. Delete *personally*.

Correct: Alicia is wrong.

- Incorrect: Margo returned back to her house.
- Which word is **redundant**?
- Correct: Margo returned home.

Words to eliminate:

Very Little Pretty (as in pretty late) Kind of Really A lot/lots of Stuff

Sort of The fact that In order to There is There are There was There were

X Rule 3: Use strong, powerful, effective words.

 Use nouns & verbs that express exact meanings without modifiers (adjectives/adverbs) or phrases



X Rule 3: Use strong, powerful, effective words.

- Bad: Morning drivers cause dirty skies, lots of traffic, and angry people
- Better: Commuters cause pollution, traffic jams, and frustrations.

QuickTime[™] and a TIFF (Uncompressed) decompressor are needed to see this picture.

X Rule 3: Use strong, powerful, effective words.

 Choose strong words that have powerful <u>connotations</u> and <u>denotations</u>.

- Connotation: feelings or impressions implied by a word
- Denotation: dictionary definition



What does this sentence say to you?

- Amy liked Eliza's haircut.
- Amy **coveted** Eliza's haircut.
- Amy yearned for Eliza's haircut.



What does this sentence say to you?

- Eliza liked Amy's brother.
- Eliza adored Amy's brother.
- Eliza worshipped Amy's brother.
